Memory Text: *“First, I thank my God through Jesus Christ for you all, that your faith is spoken of throughout the whole world.”* ([Romans 1:8 KJV](#)).

Additional Verses for Meditation and Study This Week:

Romans 15:14, 20-27; Acts 28:17-31; Philippians 1:12; Romans 1:7; Ephesians 1;

Main Thought for the Week: In the book of Romans, the grand theme of salvation is expertly laid out by the Apostle Paul, with the focus naturally upon Jesus Christ. To start out our study of Salvation by Faith this quarter, we are going to look at some of the contextual issues associated with Paul’s epistle to the Romans. Context is an important part of Bible study, because it helps us to understand the people and the circumstances that make up the Bible narrative. Context helps us answer the following questions:

- Who was speaking to whom?
- Why were they speaking?
- What were they trying to accomplish?

We can never forget, however, that God designed that the things that are recorded in His Word are for us today, and not just for historical reference (**1 Corinthians 10:11**). They have direct spiritual implications, which we can better appreciate by understanding the original context.



The Apostle Paul's Letter

Sunday's Summary – October 1:

SUMMARY THOUGHTS: One of the purposes of establishing the city of origin of the New Testament epistles is to ascertain the date of writing. Because Paul traveled a lot, knowing his location at a particular time gives us a clue to the date. Paul established the church at Corinth on his second missionary journey, A.D. 49-52 (Acts 18:1-18). On his third journey, A.D. 53-58, he visited Greece again (Acts 20:2-3) and received an offering for the saints in Jerusalem near the end of his journey (Romans 15:25-26). Therefore, the Epistle to the Romans was probably written in the early part of A.D. 58.

1. What other important churches did Paul visit on his third missionary journey?

Discuss/Consider: Is there any danger that by focusing on the context of the original messages, we can lose sight of how the various messages of Scriptures apply to us today? Why is it that we are so prone to see the correction and reproof as applying to “them” but the promises as applying to “us?” _____
